# REPORT 2017.

Rather than launch into a bunch of dry statistics I'd like to commence my report with some thanks. Thanks to all of you that made this possible.

### What is the "this" that I speak of?

"This" is our Scout Group, the family of people who come together with one intention, to bring the joy of Scouting to young people.

ALL of us have contributed in some way, the parents (and grand parents, sisters, aunties and uncles) who bring the Scouts to meetings and events, without whom there would be no young people to Scout with, to the young people themselves who commit their time from an increasingly smaller time availability given they have so many other commitments and to the volunteers who help out – be that sweeping the hut, helping at events or leading the young people to realise their capabilities – we ALL made this happen. "This" is the family of Scouting.

### So - the year in brief.

2016/17 has been a busy year, which started with the creation of a group plan which went to become part of the bigger District and County picture for Scouting. The Group Plan identified several key areas that we needed to focus on, the big ticket items being Adult Recruitment and Activity Permits.

I'm delighted to announce that we are currently ahead of the curve on our Adult recruitment plans, with rapid growth in some sections allowing us to increase our young person count in those sections.

We took steps to increase our Activity Permit count across the board, it is rather interesting that Newbold Sea Scouts holds the majority of Activity Permits in the District – this being an indication of how our programs are aligned, it takes time and effort to gain a Permit and I'd like to extend gratitude to all those leaders who took time out to attend courses and training in order to be able to lead the Young People on activities which require an Activity Permit. It should also be mentioned that we gained significant financial help from Stratford District Scouts for the adult training – without which our Group Funds would have been stretched – so thanks to them for that help.

We can now offer kayaking, canoeing, rafting, rowing, sailing, power boating, hill walking and yachting as part of our Adventurous Activity remit.

I have included a report from each Section within our AGM pack and would encourage you to read it. It provides a nice overview of what each section has done in the last year.

### Moving forward.

It's safe to say that we must always look to our group and find areas where we can improve things, we identified one such area with Adult volunteering, as a result the Group has created an Active Support Unit, which to all intents and purposes is a pool of adult volunteers, all with DBS checks who can step in at any time to help out – be that with section evenings or events, hut maintenance or logistics, the ASU volunteers spend what time they can afford to allocate to the Group, it's aimed to work around the volunteers – please do have a look at the ASU report within the pack.

We need to continue to grow the Leader base, to take the sections forward and grow our numbers of young people. The time required to spend on leadership activities directly reduces in accordance with the amount of leaders (the more we have – the less it takes!).

Our sections are vibrant and on my visits to the sections I am always impressed by the sheer enthusiasm of everyone, the activities are wide and varied and we are continuing to follow the Scout badge scheme alongside our water activity program.

There have been many notable events this last year, with Winter Weekend, several camps, a Duck Race and various projects with of course the Royal Navy Inspection – this in particular was a resounding success which culminated in our continued membership of the coveted RN Scheme, congratulations to everyone for making that happen.

Our fledgling ASU has made their presence felt with participation in several events and section meetings. Be sure to look out for the distinctive light blue polo shirts and hoodies. As a rule of thumb we'd like to encourage one person per family to sign up for the ASU (assuming that the family doesn't already contain a leader!), which will share the weight of responsibility across many, more people.

If you have any questions, comments or indeed concerns about any part of the Group activities, my door is always open. Contact me by email or mobile phone at any time — if you need to speak in private or have anything sensitive to discuss I am there to help in confidence.

I am looking forward to 2018, and continuing Scouting with the family of Newbold Sea Scouts.

## GROUP ACCOUNTS 2017.

Treasurer Julia Lucas has finalised the accounts and these are made available seperately.

### Please see the seperate accounts sheets for the financial period 01/02/16 to 31/01/17, an overview is as follows:

We have incurred a slight reduction in membership subscriptions due to impact of the changes in the group over the period.

We have moved now to collecting subscriptions and event monies via GoCardless which has been a significant admin improvement, has increased security and enabled leaders to spend more time on the programme in meetings and less on admin.

Camp fees include the money for the hugely successful whole-Group Winter Weekend, costs are shown in activity expenses.

The camp costs include the costs of WW17 and the £1400 in full and final settlement of the abortive Group expedition to Kandersteg.

Other income includes insurance payout money which has not yet been spent by 31.1.17.

The Group now has a bespoke online system for managing expenses, written by Owen. This enables leaders and others with the appropriate permissions to upload their expense claims with photos of their receipts.

The GSL receives notification and reviews the claims and contacts leaders with queries in the first instance; the

treasurer has access and uses the information on the website to make payments. This has significantly improved the admin of expenses, enabling them to be paid promptly and maintaining an on line repository of all the evidence, which can then be made available to the scrutineer in due course.

Payments are made electronically through the HSBC business internet banking platform, increasing speed and security.


Included in the total fund is £219 relating to the Explorers, the breakdown is attached in the accounts.

In future years there will be separate accounts for Explorers set out in a more formal way, although the money will still be held within the Group funds.


Issues in managing the funds are now wholly resolved, the exec receives accounts on a monthly basis and we are discussing how to manage the budgets for the sections for the coming year.
